The events organized and the activities conducted by the college in the academic year 2018-19 have been documented under 7 criteria as prescribed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council.

1. Curricular Aspects

- ➤ The **Academic Calendar** for the year 2018-19 has been provided in **Annexure I** and outlines the schedule of activities and events planned for the academic year.
- The seminars, workshops, field visits and talks by experts from different fields of specialization were organised in keeping with the students' needs as revealed by an analysis of the Entry and Exit point questionnaires (Annexure II).
- > STIE followed the Contextualized Curriculum wherein a plethora of activities were conducted by the teacher educators to enhance and enrich the syllabus prescribed by the University of Mumbai for each subject included in the curriculum. This wasbased on the constructivist theory of teaching and learning. The underlying principle was that learning takes place when teachers are able to present information in a way that students are able to construct meaning based on their own experiences. The contextualized curriculum emphasized problem solving skills, assisted students in becoming self-regulated learners, justify their reasoning, relate their learning to diverse life contexts and apply their knowledge to make learning relevant and meaningful. An overview of the Contextualized Curriculum followed for the different subjects has been provided in Annexure III.

2. Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

- ➤ The **ISI model**was used to transact the contextualized curriculum described in the earlier criterion. The acronym ISI is based on the following components:
- ✓ I Introduction to the Content (through a series of lectures /suggested reference material)
- ✓ **S** Supplementary Activities (In this phase a broad VIEW is offered to the different topics of the syllabus through:
 - ❖ V-Visits to the field
 - I-Inquiry based learning
 - E-Experiential learning
 - W-Workshops
- ✓ I Integration of the Experiences(through assessments, assignments, reflective journaling of activities conducted)

This ensured that the training provided to each student emerging from the portals of STIE bore the mark of quality. This wasachieved through a well-balanced exposure to the theoretical and practical dimensions of each subject in the course. **Annexure IV** provides a gist of the teaching strategies employed in the different subjects.

- ➤ The schedule of Curricular and Co-Curricular Activities conducted through the academic year 2018-19has been provided in **Annexure V.**
- ➤ The institution offered the Master of Arts (M.A.) Education Degree in association with IDOL (Institution of Distance and Open Learning), University of Mumbai and was a contact centre for the same. Each faculty member of STIE conducted lectures for various subjects of the course.
- ➤ The institution networked with SNDT University where three students of M.Ed. Programme completed an internship of one month duration in the college. Each of the interns taught two topics in theory courses and one in ICT Based information. They also conducted two workshops on the topics Life Skills and Team Teaching. The interns were involved in the activities of the college viz. conducting assembly, sports day, supervision etc.

3. Research, Innovations and Extension

Research

➤ The Research Cell of STIE —**Pratiti** organized the annual research paper reading session on the 12th April 2019.

➤ 19 research papers were published by the faculty in UGC approved journals with impact factor. The details of the same are provided in **Annexure VI.**

These initiatives in the area of research were in keeping with the suggestions of the NAAC that the college should work towards establishing a research culture among the faculty and students of STIE. The above mentioned research endeavours helped to disseminate the findings of research studies conducted by staff of the institution and also provided a forum for learning from studies conducted by other researchers.

Innovations

- The institution organized an ecofriendly endeavor 'Go Green With Tetrapak Campaign' which was aimed at environmental protection. It was a joint venture of all four institutions on campus viz. St. Teresa's Institute of Education, St. Teresa's Convent High School, St. Teresa's Special School and St. Teresa's Junior College of Education. This campaign was conducted in collaboration with the NGO RUR, Mumbai. 10,555 empty tetrapaks were collected and a tetrapak collection bin and one garden bench made out of recycled tetrapaks were procured in exchange. The B.Ed student teachers served as Green Champions to orient the school students and teachers to the tetrapak collection drive. The B.Ed student teachers and faculty collected the tetrapaks weekly from the 4 institutions, recycled, counted and submitted the same to RUR.
- The institution organized the 'Big Five Talk Show'to orient student teachers to the curricula, evaluation procedures/patterns and activities conducted by schools affiliated to the different Boards of education. It was a joint venture of the Alumni Organisation and the Placement Cell.

Panelists included alumni associated with schools affiliated to the SSC, ICSE, CBSE, IGCSE and IB. The talk show provided a forum for the institution to network with its own alumni and avail of their experience and expertise.

- ➤ Personality development course was organized by the college to help students enhance their personality and equip them with soft skills as teachers.10 sessions each of an hour's duration were conducted. The topics ranged from self-discovery, staff-room etiquette, and communication skills to how to present yourself at interviews, preparing C.Vs and strategies for teachers to manage classrooms etc.
- ➤ The Placement Cell of the college took an initiative to orient the student-teachers on how to prepare their **e-portfolios**. The links of the e-portfolios were shared with prospective employers of the students. It helped to link theory to practice and equip students with technological know-how, linguistic skills etc. It offered the distinct advantages of easier accessibility, keeping abreast with newer trends, paperless documentation.
- ➤ The Placement Cell of the college collaborated with GEMS Education, Dubai and organized interviews for placement of students. 10 students were recruited through the campus interview process.
- ➤ To create awareness about environmental preservation, college celebrated 'MAD (Make A Difference) Week, A Green Initiative for a Greener Planet'. During this week, students conducted assemblies on various issues in relation to the preservation of environment. In relation to the theme of each day's assembly, one activity was conducted to ensure realization of the goal of environmental preservation. The details of the same are provided in Annexure VII.
- To commemorate the Sesquicentennial Year of the Congregation of the Carmelite Religious, St. Teresa's Institute of Education celebrated this year's Children's Day with a difference. An event tilted "Showcasing Institutional Innovative Practices: An Interschool Competition" was hosted by the institute on November 14, 2018. At this competition, schools from all the city's educational Boards (SSC, CBSE, ICSE, International Boards) showcased the practices they customised to cater to the specific needs of their student population or even of a single child who needs special nurturing. The 'Institution with Distinctive Status 2018' Award was conferred on Ram Ratna International School, Bhayandar (West) for their paper presented by Vice Principal Dr.Smita Gandhi. The first runner-up institution was Udayachal Primary School, Vikhroli (East) for the paper presented by Ms Jasmine Kasad and Ms Preethi Manoj. Arya VidyaMandir, Bandra were the second runner-up; their paper was presented by Ms Neeta Tandon and Ms Sadhvi Chawla. This event was held with the purpose of encouraging the teacher community from

different Boards to come together to share their unique experiences and to learn from others' experiences. This could create networking among schools.

Extension

➤ The college participated in the Extension Education Programme conducetd by the Department of Life-long Learning and Extension (DLLE). All 98 students were enrolled for the same under the able guidance of Dr. Cindrella D'Mello and Ms.Reshma Rodrigues. Details of the activities opted for have been provided in **Annexure VIII.**



5. Student Support and Progression

- The **Honours programme** is a credit based enrichment course designed on the IDEA model.(Sheela) A summary of the activities organized for the trainees with the credits assigned to each and the grades awarded has been provided in Annexure X.
- The Campus Recruitments organized by the Placement Cell helped the trainees to have a handson experience of how to present themselves at interviews and exposed them to the requirements of
 schools affiliated to the different Boards of education. The students were also trained in soft skills
 and oriented to the guidelines of preparing their job applications/resumes prior to the campus
 placement programme. Students prepared e-portfolios in addition to their resumes. 18 schools
 from Mumbai and two institutions overseas viz. Gems Education Society and Dubai Scholars
 Association participated in the campus interview programme. 40 students were placed through
 this endeavor. Details of the schools by which they were employed are listed in Annexure XI.
 The Employer Satisfaction Survey was conducted to assess the contentment of employers who
 have absorbed students of STIE in the past years and the same is depicted graphically below.



➤ The TET (Teacher Eligibility Test) based on the National Curricular Framework has been introduced as an Indian entrance examination for teachers. It is conducted by both Central government and State governments in India and is mandatory for getting teaching jobs in

government schools from Class 1 to Class 8. To orient the students to the finer nuances of preparing for this test, STIE organized a one day TET workshop conducted by Mr. Prakash Almeida on 3rd April 2019. The session was attended by 16 teachers/teacher trainees who received a hands-on training on how to solve different types of questions ranging from language and mathematics to pedagogy. The link for feedback obtained from the delegates has been given in **Annexure XII.**

- ➤ An Alumni Meet was organized on 13thApril 2019 and attended by 36 ex-students. They shared their success stories and also made suggestions as to how they could contribute their resources to the growth of their Alma Mater. In addition, the alumni were actively involved in the 'Big Five Talk Show' to orient student teachers to the curricula, evaluation procedures/patterns and activities conducted by schools affiliated to the different Boards of education.
- The First year and Second Year B.Ed teacher trainees participated in various Intercollegiate festivals viz. 'Prayas' conducted by St. Xavier's Institute of Education, 'Udaan' Conducted by Gonsalo Garcia College of Arts and Commerce, 'Valeur' conducted by Pillai Coollege of Education and Research, 'HomiBhabha' conducted by HomiBhabha Centre for Science Education, 'My India, My Pride' conducted by Thakur Shyamnarayan College of Education and Research and 'Udaan' conducted by University of Mumbai (DLLE). The details of competitions and prize winners are provided in Annexture XIII
- ➤ The **Grievance Redressal Committee** addressed the difficulties faced by students and took appropriate action to help them overcome the same. The **Anti-ragging Cell** conducted a session to orient trainees to the need for refraining from teasing and bully-bossing. The need to maintain cordial relations with peers was stressed and students were assigned peer mentors.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

- > The Institution employed the **360 feedback mechanism** to obtain objective online evaluation of its performance from stakeholders ranging from students, parents, practice teaching schools, alumni and participants attending various activities conducted by the college. The links to the online feedback summary procured have been listed in **Annexure XII.**
- > In the academic year 2018-19two staff members were promoted; Dr Joan Lopes was promoted from Grade 1 to 2 and Dr. Cinderella D'Mellowas promoted from Grade 2 to 3.
- > A copy of the proposed Budget for the year 2019-20 is also given in annexure XIV.
- > The Institution has both IQAC (Internal quality Assurance Cell) and CDC (College Development Cell). These committees met at timely intervals and monitored the quality of instruction and performance of the Institution on the whole.
